1 Samuel 12:20-21

"...serve the LORD with all your heart. And turn not aside; for then you would go after vain things, which cannot profit deliver; for they are vain." 1 Samuel 12:20-21

What is it within the heart of man that he must insist upon chasing vanity? From the richest to the poorest, all that man possesses of this life will ultimately slip through his fingers – unless he has "laid up treasure where neither moth or rust corrupt and where thieves cannot break through and steal." (Matthew 6:19-20)
