2 Chronicles 34:1-3

"Josiah was eight years old when he began to reign... And he did what was right in the sight of the LORD, and walked in the ways of David... While he was still young, he began to seek after the God of David his father..." (2 Chronicles 34:1-3).

Do teenagers really have to be rebellious? Must they have an "attitude"? Why is it we expect young people to "sow a few wild oats"? Just because most adults did, doesn't mean young people shouldn't be held to a higher standard and be called to a higher level.

Josiah did what was right at the age of eight. His example was David (his father Amon was no example but of evil.). The Scriptures bear out this thinking.
